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

SKAGIT AUDUBON MAY CONSERVATION REPORT By TIM MANNS, CONSERVATION CHAIR

Because of a trip for desert backpacking and birding, I'm writing a full month before the May *Flyer* appears. You'll probably know before I do how things turned out in the state legislature with Audubon's priorities: a bill addressing oil transportation by rail and on marine waters and the Columbia River; the Governor's Carbon Pollution Accountability Act; and a bill to gather information needed to better manage and restore forage fish, which sustain sea birds and many other marine creatures.

Skagit Audubon recently received an update from the San Juan Preservation Trust about the campaign to repay the loan which made it possible to save **Vendovi Island** from development. The price was about \$6 million, and all that is left to raise is \$350,000, thanks in part to generous offers to match donations. At 217 acres, Vendovi is the third largest island in the San Juans with a single owner and is undeveloped except for one small site. Its nearly 3 miles of shoreline are pristine. Skagit Audubon as an organization and, I'm sure, a number of Skagit Audubon members have contributed to this campaign. To make the match, the remaining funds must be raised by June 1. You can make a lasting difference. Go to: http://sjpt.org/vendovicampaign/ This project, like the protection of Barney Lake, Guemes Mountain and many other places by Skagit Land Trust, is another example of the important habitat preservation work which land trusts do. Skagit Land Trust was founded by Skagit Audubon members (thank you, Keith Wiggers!) and is a great partner in accomplishing the Audubon mission of protecting habitat.

I'd like to also remind everyone of the great work National Audubon scientists have done using huge databases of birds sightings contributed by birders across the U.S., along with climate models, to predict how climate change will affect species habitat, range, and, ultimately, survival. SKAGIT AUDUBON HIKING ~ MAY

Hikes in May will take us from the foothills of the Cascades to the salt water. As usual, weather, logging, construction or other unexpected conditions might cause changes or cancellations in the following hikes. Dogs are discouraged on Audubon-sponsored hikes. If dogs are on a hike, they must be on a leash at all times. All the hikes are on a Wednesday. Call if you have questions anytime up until 7:45 the morning of the hike.

WED. - MAY 6 - BAKER RIVER

Hike along the Baker River to Sulfide Creek, entering the North Cascades National Park along the way. Dogs are **not** permitted on the National Park section of the trail. The hike is 5 miles round trip, with a 300 ft. elevation gain. Meet at 8:30 a.m. on the east side of the Sedro-Woolley Food Pavilion parking lot. If you do just the river hike: return to the trailhead at 1:30 p.m. If you also walk south to

Hidden Creek on the north Baker Lake Trail: return at 2:00 p.m. A Federal Northwest Forest Pass (parking permit) is required!

WED. - MAY 13 - HEATHER LAKE

Hike to and around a scenic lake at an elevation of 2,400 ft. The lake is off the Mountain Loop Highway near Mt. Pilchuck. The hike is 4.8 miles round trip with a 1,000

ft. elevation gain. Meet at 8 a.m. in the Mount Vernon Safeway parking lot. Seattle/Snohomish County/Camano Island hikers can go directly to the trailhead. Faster hikers return at 1 p.m. to the trailhead. Slower hikers return at 2:30 p.m. Carpool accordingly. A Federal Northwest Forest Pass (parking permit) is required!

WED. – MAY 20 – EBEY'S LANDING & THE KETTLES AT FORT EBEY STATE PARK

Today's hike will be done in two sections. Each car of hikers will be its own group, so plan on riding with others who will do the same hikes you do. The first hike will be a 3.6 mile loop hike up the bluff, down to the beach, and back to the cars. There is a low tide of about -2 feet about noon. One can add 2 miles to this hike by walking to the cemetery and back. The next hike will be a self-guided hike on the Kettles trails near Fort Ebey State Park. Miles hiked here depend on the individual. There should be wild rhododendrons in bloom. Meet at 9 a.m. at the March Point Park-n-Ride. (At the stop light at the intersection of HWY 20 and the Christianson and March Point Roads, turn RIGHT and then an immediate RIGHT turn onto the frontage road and soon turn LEFT into the Park-n-Ride.) **OR** meet at Ebey's Landing at 9:45 a.m. A Washington State Discover Pass is required!

WED. – MAY 27 –SKAGIT RIVER GORGE

As of April 2015 when the May hiking schedule was determined, the trail below the Ross Dam Trailhead to the base of Ross Dam was <u>still</u> closed. This is due to a huge rock slide that occurred a few years ago. Therefore this hike will begin and end

and carpool from the Sedro-Woolley USFS/NPS parking lot along highway 20 (810 State Route 20) in Sedro Woolley at 7 a.m. and plan to be out much of the day, depending on our findings and conditions. It's getting toward the peak of migration season so there should be a lot of birds to enjoy. Bring appropriate clothing, lunch, snacks, water, binos, and ears wide open.

Leader: Gary Bletsch, <u>garybletsch@yahoo.com</u> Don't forget your Discover Pass! near the North Cascades Institute above Diablo Dam. Hike 2.9 miles (about an 800 ft. total elevation gain) east to the Ross Dam View point near the power lines or 4.1 miles (about a 1,600 ft. total elevation gain) east to the Skagit River. Enjoy great views of the Skagit River Gorge along the way. There should be wild flowers. Meet at 8:00 a.m. on the east side of the Sedro-Woolley Food Pavilion parking lot. Return to cars by 2:00 p.m. Be sure to check for ticks on your body after the hike.

WED. - JUNE 3 - SAN JUAN ISLAND

Hike on trails at American Camp, Whale Watch Park/Limekiln State Park, and English Camp. Meet at 8:15 a.m. at March Point Park-n-Ride to pool rides **UNLESS** you have a full vehicle, in which case you may go directly to the ferry terminal. No ferry walk-ons as we will need cars on the island. We will take the 9:30 a.m. ferry from Anacortes, arriving in Friday Harbor at 10:35 a.m. Return ferry sailings are 4:15 p.m., 6:25 p.m., and 7:45 p.m. Therefore, each person who plans to drive should know who plans to ride with them. Drivers can notify me (Joan Melcher, see above), if they have room for riders. People who wish to ride can notify me and I will put you on a waiting list. Car pool according to return times. People staying on the island for dinner will take the 6:25 p.m. or 7:45 p.m. sailing back. Cost of ferry fare for the vehicle will be split among the riders; each person will pay their own individual fare. NOTE: This year drivers must make a reservation for both the outbound and return ferry trips.

Saturday, May 9 Upriver Birding Blitz, Honoring International Migratory Bird Day 6:30 a.m. to Late Afternoon

Meet at Sedro-Woolley USFS/NPS parking lot off Highway 20, 810 State Route 20, to carpool. Be prompt! We will do this field trip in the style of a Washington Ornitho-logical Society field trip, covering ground and trying to maximize the diversity of birds to be found along the middle to upper Skagit River. Bring energy bars, lunch, snacks, etc. Dress appropriately! This will be a long day for those who enjoy all-day birds!

Sunday, May 17 Washington Park, Anacortes Plants & Geology of Washington Park 9:00 a.m. to Noon

Walk slowly with SAS members, the Kivers, using generally easy trails searching for plant and rock stories along the edges of forest communities in this favorite west Fidalgo Island park. Join both naturalists and photographers for this leisurely walk and discussion, an ever-popular diversion from our usual focus largely on birds. Oceanspray should be in prolific bloom!

Meet at the parking area to the left as you drive into Washington Park near the rest rooms, or at least look for the group there. The walk will begin at 9 a.m. and be about three hours long. Bring water, snacks, and a lunch if desired. Birds may join us along the way!

To get to Washington Park, follow the San Juan Ferry signs through Anacortes (at the roundabout go north on Commercial to 12th St., then west on 12th St., which becomes Oakes Avenue). At the traffic light just above the ferry, keep to the left and continue on Sunset Ave. to its end at the park. Bring your binoculars and dress for the weather. Thursday Night, May 28 to Sunday, May 31 Okanagon Trip, From Conconully State Park to Sinlahekin Wildlife Area & the Okanogan Highlands

Included are two all-day field trips on Friday and Saturday, May 29th & 30th, and a Sunday morning walk, May 31st. This is a birding weekend recommended for folks with the desire for some all-day birding, generally not beginners! Last year was such a success the field trip committee decided we will be having another three and a half day event staying in the Conconully area. Participants are in charge of arranging their own overnight accommodations. Last year about half of us stayed in a motel in Conconully and half camped in the Conconully State Park. Our dates are planned for the weekend **following** Memorial Day which means meeting up in Conconully Campground at 7 p.m., Thursday night. Morning birding departures will be at 6:15 a.m. from the campground. We will only do the trip with a minimum of ten people, and a maximum of 25. Obtaining a site in the campground on the day of arrival, at this time of the year is usually not hard.

A Discover Pass is Needed for the Wildlife Area!

June 11, Thursday Big Four Trail and Wetlands 6:30 or 8:00 a.m. to Early Afternoon

Meet at 6:30 a.m. at Exit 212 off of I-5 Park & Ride for carpools or 8 a.m. at the Big 4 Picnic Area on Mountain Loop Highway 92. The Big Four area lies along the south fork of the Stillaguamish River east of Granite Falls. The birding is exceptional in June and the picnic area has spectacular views of Big Four Mountain and Hall Peak. The 1 mile trail takes you on a boardwalk across a fresh water marsh. Expect to see Red-breasted Sapsuckers, Flycatchers, and Warblers. As we cross a bridge over the south fork of Stillagauamish River we will look for Dippers, Common Mergansers, Harlequin Ducks and Spotted Sandpipers. Entering into the forest, Pacific Wrens, Brown Creepers, Western Wood-Pewees and Thrushes may appear. Eventually we reach a huge cirque that ends at a lookout area. We'll plan to eat lunch here. Wear hiking boots and expect to walk a leisurely 2 miles round trip, with a 200 ft. elevation gain. We will break up in the early afternoon.


Friday Night, June 19 to Sunday, June 21 Klipchuck Campground Mile 175, State Route 20

Each summer members and friends of Skagit Audubon gather in this U.S Forest Service Campground off Highway 20, 1.2 miles up a side road on the north side of the highway near Highway mile 175, at elevation 2,900 feet. There are usually plenty of sharp eyes in our group and the birding is great right on the campground loops as well as on nearby trails and birding areas further down in the Methow Valley. There is no schedule or plan beyond a Saturday night dinner potluck. Klipchuck is a magnet for Warblers and Vireos, Flycatchers and Woodpeckers, Hummingbirds and wildflowers. Deer are usually fawning around the campground so dogs are not recommended and must be kept on leashes. It's about 6 miles to Mazama (the nearest store), so come with what you need or plan to drive a bit further to re-supply. Overnight campground fee is \$12 per site. Vault toilets and water are available. If you prefer to get accommodations in the Methow Valley there are several motels in Mazama area as well as further down the valley. If you plan to hike from a trailhead be sure to bring your Northwest Forest Pass, Interagency Annual Pass, or Interagency Senior Pass, available from the U.S. Forest Service office in Sedro-Woolley and Winthrop. Everyone is welcome!
