A mid-February Skagit Audubon trip took nine of us to Sharpe Park and Rosario Head near Deception Pass. When we spotted Harlequins in their usual spot beyond Rosario Beach, one participant remarked, "It's a good day when you see both a Wood Duck (as we had at Sharpe Park) and Harlequins." Add to those striking birds Hooded and Red-breasted Mergansers, hundreds, possibly thousands, of Red-throated Loons riding the Deception Pass currents, Black Oystercatchers, Black Turnstones, 3 species of Cormorants, and we could readily declare it another great Skagit day. Earlier in February, the Dept. of Fish & Wildlife's survey found over 9,000 swans in the county, three-quarters of them Trumpeters and the rest Tundras. Right now multiple flocks of thousands of Snow Geese resemble fresh snow on Fir Island fields. Raptors are abundant on the Samish Flats. The winter bird show is in full swing, but anticipation is in the air too; the whole fantastic avian scene is about to shift. A few Barn and Tree Swallows have been reported. As this Skagit Flyer issue comes out, Rufous Hummingbirds and other early migrants will be reappearing from the south even as all the winter company starts northward.

We want this seasonal cycle of life to go on forever. At the least, we don't want to contribute to its demise. There's a lot we can do, a lot we need to do, to ensure that the earth's birdlife endures, for its own sake as well as for our enjoyment and well-being. Here in Washington State, the legislature is in session and facing the daunting task of balancing the budget. Realistically, it's not the time to look for increased public spending to protect the environment, but it is realistic to

Raptor Perches Planted at the West-90!

The place birders know as the West-90, where the road to Samish Island takes a sharp northward turn, has been one of the must-visit places for raptor watching for years now. Distant fence posts get a lot of attention, and a good spotting scope is pretty much a necessity for seeing the birds. Skagit Audubon member Joe Halton organized a project in February to increase the watchable wildlife opportunities at the West-90 for photographers and those not equipped with stronger optics. With permission from Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife, Joe and other volunteers transported two large Madrona limbs (windfall from Washington Park obtained with the park's permission) to the West-90. On February 7 they installed two as raptor perches within good viewing distance of the parking lot and will install a third near the closest pond when the water level recedes. Helping Joe with this project were Belinda Schuster (Assistant Manager, Skagit Wildlife Area), Bill Testerman, and Warren Tessler. Four days after installation, Joe stopped by the West-90 and spotted a Bald Eagle using the first perch installed. Success! Thank you, Joe, Belinda, Bill, and Warren!

speak out for preserving core environmental programs and for devising new ways of supporting what needs to be done. We should all be willing, for example, to contribute a fee when we use our state parks and other public lands. It's reasonable to expect companies that supply petroleum products and other potentially hazardous substances to pay for adequate oil spill protection and to reduce toxic stormwater runoff that pollutes Puget Sound. As consumers, in the end we pay these costs whether through direct taxation or increased prices, but that's what it takes for a large human population to live as we do and still share the world with wild creatures such as birds. Audubon as an organization has always tried to see this larger picture - not just birds in imaginary isolation from everything else happening in the world.

For Audubon to continue acting in support of the natural world and a healthy environment for all, it needs to thrive as an organization. It is the only environmental group with a presence all across Washington State. Every one of Washington's 26 Audubon chapters depends heavily, and most depend entirely, on volunteers. Skagit Audubon continues from year to year because members volunteer to lead field trips, organize programs, provide meeting refreshments, and serve on the board. Board terms are just one year, and many members have served several or many. Saturday, March 12 Samish Island Field Trip 8: a. m. to 12:00 p.m. Meet at Howard Armstrong's home located on Samish Island at 10833 Halloran Road. Feel free to park in Howard's driveway to leave room for public parking across the street. Plan to bird and walk about 3 miles at a slow pace. We'll look for the usual common land birds and seabirds with a chance for Peregrine Falcon and other raptors. This walk is good for beginners as well as birders of all abilities. Conditions permitting, you may have a chance to work on your bird song ID skills too as the sun pushes toward equinox. Dress appropriately for an outdoor walk, and bring your favorite birding gear. Sunday, March 20 Wiley Slough and Fir Island 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon



Meet at the Wiley Slough east parking lot with your Washington Dept. Fish & Wildlife parking pass. Explore Fir Island for spring migrants and waterfowl. Details to follow in field trip emails. Leader Tim Manns: bctm@fidalgo.net or 360-336-8753

Saturday, March 26 Washington Park, west of Anacortes 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon

This bird walk will be geared to beginning birders, but those with more experienced will see plenty as well. Being on a paved road (closed to cars until 10:00 a.m.), it is especially suited to folks who have difficulty walking on rugged trails. The first half mile is level, so anyone with limited mobility or in a wheelchair is invited to join the group this part of the walk. The loop road runs through fir forests along the edge of Guemes Channel and Burrows Channel, providing opportunities to view the sea birds (pigeon guillemots, cormorants, marbled murrelets, black oystercatchers, harlequin ducks, great blue herons, various gulls, surf scoters, red necked grebes, and others are likely) - as well as the various sparrows, wrens, chickadees, kinglets, woodpeckers and other forest birds.

We'll meet at 8:30 in the parking area near the restrooms (just past the boat trailer lot) and plan on about two hours to walk the loop road. After that, if time permits, those who wish may drive with us to other Fidalgo Island birding sites.

To get to Washington Park, follow the San Juan Ferry signs through Anacortes (at the roundabout go north on Commercial to 12th, then west on 12th, which becomes Oakes Ave.). At the traffic light just above the ferry, keep to the left and continue on Sunset Ave. to its end at the park. Bring your binoculars (and scope if you have one) and dress for the weather. We'll go rain or shine. Leaders: Jack and Cynthia Richardson, email: richrson@cnw.com



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Five hikes are scheduled for March. Unexpected circumstances such as unforeseen trail problems, weather, snow, land slides, floods, logging, construction, or road conditions may cause cancellations or changes in the following hikes. A hike will be canceled if there are high wind warnings, flooding conditions, land slides, or snowy or icy road conditions. If you have questions or want information on any of the hikes, call JOAN MELCHER, 360-424-0407 or e-mail at jdmelcher@comcast.net. All the hikes are on a Wednesday. Dogs are discouraged on Audubon-sponsored hikes. If dogs are on a hike, they must be on a leash at all times.

MARCH 2 LILY LAKE LOOP

Hike the Lily Lake Trail to Lily Lake and North Butte on Blanchard Mountain. Return to trail head via Max's Shortcut and the Larry Reed Trail. The hike is a 8.5 mile loop with 1,600 ft. total elevation gain. Meet at 8:30 a.m. at the I-5/Cook Road Park-n-Ride. 2:30 p.m. is the return to trailhead time.

MARCH 9 GOOSE ROCK PERIMETER HIKE

Hike a loop that includes Cranberry Lake, beaches, the south side of Deception Pass, Cornet Bay and a 450 foot climb up Goose Rock. Total elevation gain for the day is 750 feet. Meet at 9 a.m. in the east side parking lot at Cranberry Lake near the main entrance to Deception Pass State Park. 6.2 miles makes the basic loop hike. You may add 4.0 miles if you hike on the beach south to the naval station border (10.2 miles); You may leave when your car of people has returned to the trailhead.

MARCH 16 SHAW ISLAND

A loop hike on Shaw Island with a 300 ft. total elevation gain, stopping for lunch at Hoffman Cove and visiting a San Juan Island County park. Depending on your route, there is anywhere from 5.6 to 8.4 miles. Round trip foot passenger fare is required. Meet at the Anacortes/San Juan Islands Ferry Terminal, 2100 East Ferry Road (follow 12th St. west from Commercial Ave.). Allow ample time to find parking. One must pay to park at the terminal ,so you may wish to pool rides. Ferry departure time is 7:40 a.m. **NOTE EARLY FERRY TIME**. Return ferry times from Shaw to Anacortes are 12:20 or 4:15 pm.

MARCH 23 PINE AND CEDAR LAKES AND/OR RAPTOR RIDGE

Hike to two very pleasant lakes in the Chuckanut Mountain area. It is up to 9.6 miles one way with shuttle cars with a 1,900 ft. total elevation gain. The 1.7 mile uphill route from the Pine/Cedar Trailhead is steep. The 4.0 mile down-hill route via the Hemlock Trail back to the North Chuckanut parking lot is less steep and will lead to Arroyo Park, the Interurban Trail, and finally the North Chuckanut parking lot. On the way down pass the side trail to Raptor Ridge. Other hike options available. Meet at 9:00 a.m. at the North Chuckanut parking lot located off Chuckanut Drive just north of California Street at about milepost 18.5. There is a 2 p.m. return to the North Chuckanut lot ,if the weather is poor; 2:30 p.m. return if the weather is sunny. Drivers will be shuttled back to their cars.

MARCH 30 DISCOVER OLD AND NEW ANACORTES

Wendy Gray and Mac Madenwald will lead us on a walking tour of the features of old and new Anacortes. Meet at 9 am at the Soroptimist Station Tommy Thompson Trail parking lot. (From Highway 20, enter Anacortes on R Avenue, take a right on 30th Street; you will be heading east. Go two blocks and park in the Soroptimist Station lot or on the street if the lot is full.) The hike will be eight or more miles.

APRIL 6 BAKER RIVER

Hike along the Baker River to Sulfide Creek, entering the North Cascades National Park along the way. The hike is 5 miles round trip with 300 ft. elevation gain. Meet at 8:30 a.m. on the east side of the Sedro-Woolley Food Pavilion parking lot. A Northwest Forest Pass (parking permit) required. 1:30 p.m. is return time to the trailhead.





