Understanding Shorebirds: The Miracle of Migration

This program looks at the epic migrations of shorebirds, focusing on eight of the thirty-eight common shorebirds found in Washington. We explore the trans-ocean migration of Bar-tailed Godwits, Pacific Golden-Plovers, Sanderlings and other birds that cross the majority of the Pacific Ocean. Topics such as where they migrate, why they migrate and how they are able to travel so far are covered. These global migrants require global conservation and climate change solutions. In an effort to understand their remarkable journeys we need to look beyond the North American borders and see where shorebirds spend most of their lives.

Tim Boyer is a professional nature photographer with a primary focus on the birds of North America. Shorebirds are his favorite group of birds, and he spends a lot of weekends on the Washington Coast. Tim sells fine art prints at art festivals in Washington and Oregon, and leads photography workshops throughout the year.

On behalf of Skagit Audubon, I was honored to receive Skagit Land Trust's 2014 Development Award at their Annual Members' Meeting in Mount Vernon on March 28. The award was given to our chapter in recognition of many years of financial and volunteer support. Most recently, we made a contribution that helped the Land Trust apply for a grant to purchase the Bell Property which is an important 16-acre addition to their Barney Lake Conservation Area east of Mount Vernon. The Trust was successful because with our contribution it could demonstrate support from local organizations. Skagit Land Trust's work corresponds nicely with Audubon's mission of conserving and restoring natural ecosystems, focusing on birds, other wildlife, and their habitats. Many of our members also volunteer for Skagit Land Trust by serving as board members, land stewards and event volunteers.

Those of you who are new to Skagit Audubon may not know that our leaders founded the Skagit Land Trust in 1992 when they were offered a gift of land that they knew Skagit Audubon was unable to receive. One of the founders was Keith Wiggers. Many of you know Keith and Jan as outstanding field trip leaders.

The second annual Regional Meeting of Audubon Washington was again held at Padilla Bay in late March. In addition to Skagit Audubon this group includes North Cascades, Whidbey, San Juan Islands and Pilchuck Audubon chapters, and several members of our board attended. I particularly enjoyed hearing about the educational activities of each chapter. There were also chapter reports on conservation issues and we discussed prospects for collaboration around points of common interest and involvement.

Gail Gatton, Executive Director of Audubon Washington, spoke about a proposed strategy being developed for the National Audubon Society's Bird Friendly Communities campaign. Also in attendance was Art Wang, current Vice President of Tacoma Audubon, who will represent Alaska, Washington and Oregon when he becomes a board member of the National Audubon Society in 2015. He has an impressive background, including 14 years as an elected State Representative and as a Judge on the Washington Court of Appeals.

As you can see, it's a pleasure to associate with such impressive and like-minded individuals and organizations.

SKAGIT AUDUBON MAY CONSERVATION REPORT**By TIM MANNS, CONSERVATION CHAIR**

Fewer fish mean fewer marine birds. Two years ago National Audubon issued its *Strategic Plan 2012-2015* laying out broad conservation themes within a flyway-based geographical approach. Among other things, the plan has led to significant improvements in communication among state Audubon groups and chapters. Here in Washington, the decision was made to focus the largest conservation efforts on marine birds first, given their significance in the Pacific Flyway. Dr. Trina Bayard, Director of Bird Conservation for Audubon Washington, has drafted a plan very relevant to Skagit Audubon titled *Audubon Washington Coastal Campaign: Marine Birds and Fish*. The *Fish* in the title are forage fish, little ones comprising the main diet of many seabirds and certain waterfowl species wintering in Puget Sound and the nearby bays and straits. Some of these birds, such as pigeon guillemots, live here year-round. Studies show many marine bird populations are declining, and a parallel decline in forage fish may be one reason. The proposed Audubon campaign would support more research into the status of forage fish populations and their sufficiency for the dietary needs of bird populations. We know places in Skagit County such as Fidalgo Bay Aquatic Reserve are important spawning areas for three principal forage fish: Pacific herring, surf smelt, and Pacific sand lance. We also know that armoring shorelines around much of Puget Sound and the bays has deprived beaches of replenishment from feeder bluffs with resulting loss of conditions that smelt and sand lance need to spawn. And we know that removal of shade trees from shoreline areas dries and kills the eggs of these fish. Audubon's proposed campaign includes public

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education about shoreline management with ways home owners can help marine birds by helping forage fish. As a start on this campaign, Audubon Washington has drafted comment letters to federal and state agencies now working on regulating forage fish harvest. Skagit Audubon is adding its support.

To better address conservation issues relevant to Audubon, I'd like to gather email addresses of members interested in being alerted to opportunities to comment. I'm also recruiting members to form a Conservation Committee to help develop our chapter's response to issues. Hikes in May will take us from the foothills of the Cascades to the salt water. As usual, weather, logging, construction or other unexpected conditions might cause changes or cancellations in the following hikes. If you have questions or want information on any of the hikes, call **JOAN MELCHER, 360-424-0407**, or e-mail jdmelcher@comcast.net. All the hikes are on a Wednesday. Dogs are discouraged on Audubon-sponsored hikes. If dogs are on a hike, they must be on a leash at all times.

***Starred hikes require a Washington State Discover Pass for parking your vehicle.**

***WED. – MAY 7 – LOST LAKE TRAIL**

Hike to a mirror lake in a rock trench on Chuckanut Mountain. Both options below will utilize a new trail connecting the Cyrus Gates Overlook with the Lost Lake Trail in the trench below.

Option I is a **STRENUOUS** 10 mile hike with an elevation gain of 2,400 feet. For **Option I (strenuous)** meet at 8:30 a.m. at the Lost Lake parking lot (formerly known as the Clayton Beach lot) at the south end of Larrabee State Park off Chuckanut Drive. Return time for this hike will be 3 p.m.

Option II is a much less strenuous 7 mile hike with several hundred feet of elevation gain.

For **Option II** meet at 9 a.m. at the North Chuckanut parking lot located on the east side of Chuckanut Drive between the Old Samish Highway and California Street. This is about milepost 18.5. **Option II** hikers will pool rides and drive to the Cyrus Gates Overlook where the hike will begin. Return time to the North Chuckanut parking lot will be at 2 p.m. Drivers will need to be shuttled back to the Cyrus Gates Overlook.

***Discover Pass REQUIRED for those parking in Larrabee State Park.**

Discover Pass NOT REQUIRED for those parking in the North Chuckanut parking lot.

***WED. – MAY 14 – WALLACE FALLS**

This hike travels through forest and near spectacular waterfalls north of Gold Bar along the Stevens Pass Highway. **Meet at 8 a.m.** in the S.E. corner of the Mount Vernon Safeway parking lot. Seattle/Snohomish County/Camano Island hikers can go directly to trailhead. Car pool according to the option you choose below:

OPTION 1: This hike is up to a seven mile loop, including a 1,400 foot elevation gain to the top falls.

The return time is 2 p.m.

OPTION 2: This hike is a 9.8 mile to 14 mile loop, with an 1,800 foot elevation gain to Wallace Lake.

The return time is 3:30 p.m..

***Washington State Discover pass required to park at Wallace Falls State Park.**

WED. – MAY 21 – OYSTER DOME

This hike is to the Oyster Dome on Blanchard Mountain.

OPTION 1: Begin and end at the Pacific Northwest

Trail T.H. on Chuckanut Drive near mile post 10. The hike is 9 miles, with a 2,000 foot elevation gain. **Meet at 9 a.m. at this location.** Hikers need to download the map and instructions from the SWITMO web site, SWITMO.org. Go to the "Great Hikes" page and under "Skagit County hikes" click on "Blanchard, Oyster Dome from Chuckanut Drive and back". If you wish, you may meet Joan Melcher at the Chuckanut Park-n-Ride by 8:30 a.m. to get a map and instructions. **At 2:30 p.m. return to T.H.**

***OPTION 2:** Begin and end the hike at the Samish Overlook. It is a 6.0 to 7.4 mile hike, with a 900 foot elevation gain. **At 2:00 p.m. return to T.H.** There are opportunities for side trips to North Butte, Lily Lake, and Lizard Lake. **Meet at 8:30 a.m.** at the Chuckanut Drive Park-n-Ride, exit 231 from I-5 on the east side of I-5.

***Washington State Discover Pass required at the Samish Overlook.**

***WED. – MAY – 28 EBEBY'S LANDING and THE KETTLES at FORT EBEBY STATE PARK**

Today's hike will be done in two sections. Each car of hikers will be its own group so plan on riding with others who will do the same hikes you do. The first hike will be a 3.6 mile loop hike up the bluff, down to the beach, and back to the cars. There is a low tide of about -1.5 feet about 10:30 a.m. One can add 2 miles to this hike by walking to the cemetery and back. The next hike will be a self-guided hike on the Kettles trails near Fort Ebey State Park. Miles hiked here depend on the individual. There should be wild rhododendrons in bloom. Meet at 9 a.m. at the March Point Park-n-Ride. (At the stop light at the intersection of HWY 20 and the Christianson and March Point Roads, turn RIGHT and then an immediate RIGHT turn onto the frontage road and soon turn LEFT into the Park-n-Ride.) **OR** meet at Ebey's Landing at 9:45 a.m. ***Discover Pass required at Fort Ebey State Park & Ebey Landing parking lot.**

WED. – JUNE 4 – ORCAS ISLAND

This is a hike of 8 or more miles, with up to a 1,600 foot elevation gain. Several hike options will be available in Moran State Park. Return on the 5:15 p.m. ferry or the later 7:50 p.m. ferry, if you wish to have dinner in

Eastsound. Meet at **6:30 a.m.** at the March Point Park-n-Ride. (At the stop light at the intersection of HWY 20 and the Christianson and March Point Roads, turn RIGHT and then an immediate RIGHT turn onto the frontage road and soon turn LEFT into the Park-n-Ride.)

We will take the 7:35 a.m. sailing from Anacortes to Orcas Island. No “ferry walk-ons” as we will need cars on the island. Ferry fare is required. **A Washington State Discover Pass is required to park in Moran State Park!**

Guemes Mountain, Spring Birds, & Wildflowers

7:30 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

Meet at the Guemes Ferry parking area on K Avenue off 6th Street in Anacortes for carpooling to Guemes Island. We will catch the 8:30 a.m. ferry, drive to the Guemes Mountain trailhead and do the 2.3 mile round-trip hike at a leisurely pace. The route climbs 550 feet in elevation to the island’s high point at 688 feet where the Skagit Land Trust owns 70 acres. With nice weather, the views are panoramic. We’ll look and listen for forest birds in the Douglas-fir and western red-cedar forest lower on the mountain and some different species in the red alder stands further up. There will probably be wildflowers in bloom and yet another set of bird species on the grassy summit. If time permits, we may also visit other places on Guemes. Bring: Lunch and water. Subject: [Tweeters] Tracking "Island Girl" North for Her Sixth Satellite Migration (!)

This remarkable peregrine, Island Girl, that we tagged in Chile six years ago, has just begun another northbound migration towards her nest on Baffin Island, Canada. We now have five complete years of data on her transcontinental movements and are hoping for more.

She left her wintering area on the coast of Chile (same location every year) a couple of days ago and, as usual, you can see her current position based on our three signals per day via the FRG website at

www.frg.org

Pretty sure that this is a record for a satellite-tagged peregrine. Amazed that her GPS solar powered transmitter from Microwave Telemetry has lasted for so long.

And for all of you that have contributed to this project thanks again
This would not be happening without you guys.

“Island Girl” Begins Her Third GPS Migration South

20 Sept. 2011 After spending her summer on Baffin Island, “Island Girl” has started her southbound migration towards Chile.

This will be her third trip south wearing a backpack GPS satellite transmitter. She was originally captured and tagged by Kathy Gunther and Bud Anderson at the Putu dune field of southern Chile on 15 March 2009. She also went through the 2010 earthquake with us in Chile.

She appears to have a really precise internal clock as she has departed Baffin on either the 20th or 21st of September each time, a rough departure period of about 24 hours, and very near the fall equinox (September 23).

01 Oct. 2011: So “Island Girl” is making her way out over the Gulf right now. Sounds like the weather could be much better. Headwinds that strong (15-20 knots) are very difficult to overcome.

03 Oct. 2011: Frankly, I am relieved to report that “Island Girl” is definitely heading for the Texas coast. She is very likely flying south towards Padre Island as I write this blog. “Island Girl” continued to follow the coast south to Brownsville and crossed into Mexico there. She looks to have flown over Matamoros, Mexico.

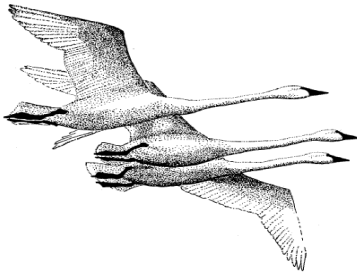
13 Oct. 2011: On her 24th day of migration this fall, “Island Girl” flew about 90 miles (145 km) across Honduras. An interesting aspect of her behavior is the variation in her route. It is different from her previous 2 fall migrations.

30 Oct. 2011: She roosted at 5,200 feet in elevation (1,505 meters) on the lower slopes of an active Andean strato-volcano, Volcan Galero (14,028 feet). This is the most active volcano in Colombia, having erupted just last year.

“Island Girl” Returns Home-Safely Completes her Third GPS Migration

12 Nov. 2011: So after **53 days of migration**, crossing through **twelve countries** (Canada, US, Mexico, Guatemala, Honduras, Nicaragua, Costa Rica, Panama, Colombia, Ecuador, Peru and Chile) and two hemispheres, and flying at least **8,628 miles (13,885 km)**, “Island Girl” has completed her migration.
