Contribute to Science Through Birding

The Puget Sound Seabird Survey is looking for birders in Skagit County – in particular, the Edison area - to join this established Community Science program. Volunteers are asked to conduct 7 surveys with a small team of fellow surveyors at specific locations throughout the Sound. All surveys are synchronized to take place once per month on the first Saturday, October – April. You will be provided training in the survey technique, and ideally will have good seabird identification skills. However, there are



roles on the survey teams for birders of all levels. Now in its 15th season, you'll be contributing to valuable science that monitors wintering seabirds across Puget Sound and informs important management decisions. Previously, the project was part of Birds Connect Seattle's (formerly Seattle Audubon) science program but transitioned to its new home at Puget Sound Bird Observatory in 2022. Saturday June 17, 2023, Barnaby Slough near Rockport, 8:30 a.m. to noon

Barnaby Slough is a complex of oxbow wetlands on the south side of the Skagit River east of Rockport. It's a great place to see neotropical migrants such as warblers, flycatchers, tanagers, and vireos. Wetland birds such as grebes, herons, and rails are possible. Meet at 8:30 am at the turnoff to the old fish hatchery on Martin Ranch Road: Take SR20 east to Rockport. At Rockport, turn right on SR530. About 1.6 miles south of SR20, turn left on Rockport-Cascade Road. In about 1.5 miles, turn left on Martin Ranch Road. In about 1.25 miles, you'll reach the turnoff to the old fish hatchery. Two or three vehicles can park at the gate on the old hatchery access road. Others can park to the side of the turnoff or along the shoulder of Martin Ranch Road. (N48.479906 W121.536426). Tuesday, June 20 to Friday, June 23 – Klipchuck Campground & The Methow Valley (Mile 175, SR20) Leader: Libby Mills; libbymills@gmail.com

Each summer members and friends of Skagit Audubon gather in this U.S. Forest Service Campground off Highway 20, 1.2 miles up a side road on the north side of the highway near Highway Mile 175, at elevation 2,900 ft. There are usually plenty of sharp eyes in our group and the birding is good right on the campground loops as well as on nearby trails and birding areas further down in the Methow Valley. There is no schedule or plan beyond a Wednesday night dinner potluck. Informal groups form to look for birds, or folks go out on their own with binoculars or cameras. Libby offers to lead morning walks Wednesday and Thursday mornings. Klipchuck is a magnet for warblers, vireos, flycatchers, woodpeckers, hummingbirds, and wildflowers. A trail to Driveway Butte leads up and up the hill right out of the campground for the ambitious hiker. It's about 6 miles to Mazama, the nearest store, and alternate lodging. The overnight campground fee is around \$12 per site. Vault toilets and water (call ahead to the Ranger District in Winthrop to confirm water availability) are available. If you plan to hike from a trailhead, bring your Northwest Forest Pass, Interagency Pass, or Senior Pass.. If you need more information: Contact Libby Mills at libbymills@gmail.com. Meet at the North Cascades National Park Office, 810 State Route 20, Sedro-Woolley at 7:30 am for car pooling. We'll make several stops along the way (Corkindale, Marblemount boat launch, County Line Ponds, Newhalem Ponds, etc.) to our final destination, the Washington Pass Overlook where we'll have lunch and walk easy trails. The trip will not be accessible due to the trails. Possible birds might be Clark's Nutcracker, Gray Jay, Mountain Chickadee, American Redstart, 3 species of finches, Sooty Grouse and more. FUN FACTS WESTERN TANAGER

- Summer visitor in Western Washington
- Closely associated with Doug-Fir forests
- Ranges farther north (into Canadian Rockies) than any other tanager
- Nests in open parts of the tree canopy
- Female does all nest building
- Can be attracted to feeders offering cut oranges and dried fruits
- Live at altitudes up to 10,000 feet
- Attracted to water features such as bird baths and ponds with moving water

HAPPY BIRDBATHS = HAPPY BIRDS! by Mary Sinker

Have you considered adding a water feature to your yard but weren't quite sure how to do it? It's easier than you may think — a simple saucer on the ground or premade birdbath from the store provide an essential source of water for birds. Select a site where you can view the birdbath without disturbing the birds. Provide shrubs or other cover close to the birdbath so wet birds have a place to preen and be safe from predators. Keep the birdbath clean at all times because algae grow quickly and are harmful to birds. Wash the birdbath regularly with hot water and a clean scrub brush before refilling with clean water. The birdbath should be shallow — only one or two inches of water, max. Moving water is particularly attractive to birds and if you plan to add a pump to move water, place your birdbath close to electrical power or use a recirculating fountain. A plastic jug hung above the birdbath with a small hole in the bottom of the jug will slowly drip water into the birdbath. Birds also need a constant, clean supply of water during cold months, so consider adding a birdbath heater to keep the water from freezing. Species of birds not attracted to seed feeders can be attracted to water features, so you may receive new visitors. Happy birdbaths = happy birds!



FUN FACTS WHITE-tailed KITE

- Rare in Western Washington
- Small distribution in US with largest ranges in California and Texas
- Hover facing into the wind with head down as if attached to kite string – behavior known as "kiting"
- Grasslands (not heavily grazed), savannahs and open woodlands are preferred habitats
- Small mammals main prey
- Can hover from 80 feet high before diving to catch prey
- Nests built high up in trees 10-160 feet tall
