

Professor John Marzluff's presentation will be based on his latest book, Welcome to Subirdia: Sharing Our Neighborhoods with Wrens, Robins, Woodpeckers and Other Wildlife. We all know that human development can threaten the environment. Runoff pollutes our streams. Homes and businesses encroach on wilderness habitat. Energy use warms the planet. Too many species are in decline. And yet... for some of our most charismatic wild creatures, suburban and urban habitats offer surprising opportunities to thrive.

Welcome to Subirdia reveals that our suburbs and city parks are often remarkably rich in bird diversity—holding more species than either wilderness areas or urban centers. In fact, suburbs may play a key role in preventing loss of species in the face of the dramatic disruptions of climate change and other human impacts. By bearing the well-being of birds in mind as we develop and live in exurban, suburban, and urban environments, we can have a tremendous and lasting positive impact.

John Marzluff is James W. Ridgeway Professor of Wildlife Science at the University of Washington, where he teaches ornithology, urban ecology, conservation and field research. His previous books include, *In the Company of Crows and Ravens* (with Tony Angell), *Dog Days, Raven Nights* (with his wife Colleen), and *Gifts of the Crow* (with Tony Angell). He is a Fellow of the American Ornithologists' Union.

Bald Eagles are one of the most visible and powerful birds living in the Skagit Valley. Their numbers have made a remarkable comeback from a low in the 1970's all over the continent. Migratory Bald Eagles make a big presence all winter feeding on both salmon along our river and waterfowl throughout our fields and wetlands. March is the beginning of the nesting season and this program will look at a year in the life of the Bald Eagle.

Our speaker Libby Mills has worked for 23 seasons following wintering eagles for the Nature Conservancy on the preserve by Rockport. She is a very popular class and field trip leader for Skagit Audubon and North Cascades Institute.

PRESIDENT'S FEBRUARY~MARCH MESSAGE

In December many of us spent a great day outdoors participating in the National Audubon's Christmas Bird Count, along with tens of thousands of others across North America. This count started in 1900 and is now in its 115th year. Skagit Audubon's Padilla Bay CBC was started in the 1990s and, like all count areas, is a 15-mile diameter circle. Ours is split into 16 areas. It starts in the northwest near the northern tip of Samish Island and extends almost to Edison in the northeast, and continues east of the Skagit County Airport to La Conner, then west to Deception Pass and the north end of Whidbey Island. It's an ideal area since it includes most of the best birding areas in Western Skagit County.

My first direct involvement with the CBC after we moved to Skagit County in 2000 was in the Similk Bay area where I tagged along with Steve and Gail Aslanian and learned how the count was done. The next year I accompanied John Douglass on March Point/East Anacortes and I've done that area ever since. About ten years ago, Joe Halton organized our section into 3 sub-areas, with Joe, Ivar Dolph and me as leaders.

Nearly 65 people participated in our count. The weather wasn't ideal, as we had some rain, but the sun actually shone briefly in the afternoon. The count wouldn't be possible without Tim Manns, who along with Alice Turner organized all the area leaders and participants ahead of time, and Bob Kuntz who has compiled and submitted the results for many years. These results will be available on our website (http://www.skagitaudubon.org/birding/christmas-bird-count) by the end of January. These are both time-consuming tasks and we owe them a big thanks. Many thanks go out to all of you who participated.

The CBC is an important part of what Audubon calls Citizen Science. Data has now been collected for more than one hundred years and helps researchers study the long-term health and status of bird populations across North America and provides a picture of how bird populations have changed in time and space over this period of time.

If you would like to participate in a bird count, you don't have to wait until next December. You can participate in the Great Backyard Bird Count, which takes place February 13 – 16, 2015. Launched in 1998 by the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and National Audubon Society, the GBBC was the first online citizen-science project to collect data on wild birds and to quickly display results. Since then, more than 100,000 people from across the world have joined the count to create an annual snapshot of the distribution and abundance of birds. Unexpected circumstances such as weather, logging, washouts, closed trails, construction, or road conditions may cause cancellations or changes in the following hikes. A hike will be canceled if there are high wind warnings, flooding conditions, predictions of heavy rain, or snowy or icy roads. Dogs are discouraged on Audubon-sponsored hikes. If dogs are on a hike, they must be on a leash at all times. All the hikes are on a Wednesday. Call if you have questions anytime up until 7:45 the morning of the hike. **Contact: Joan Melcher: 360-424-0407** or idmelcher@comcast.net

WED. - FEB. 4 - SUGAR LOAF & MT. ERIE

Hike in the popular Anacortes Forest Lands. Terry Slotemaker, 360-293-6514, or his designee, will lead us on a 5 mile hike, with a 1,400 ft. total elevation gain. Meet at 9 a.m. at the Mt. Erie parking lot off the Heart Lake Road south of Anacortes. Most are back to the trailhead by 1 p.m. You may leave when you return to the trailhead vehicle. A Washington State Discover Pass is required for your vehicle!

WED. - FEB. 11 - CAMANO ISLAND

Friends of Camano Island Parks (FOCIP) will lead us on hikes on Camano Island. The main hike is up to 11.9 miles, with shorter options available. Lunch is provided with a suggested donation of \$2. Meet at 8:00 a.m. in the S.E. corner of the Mount Vernon Safeway parking lot or at 8:30 a.m. at the Blue Camano Center Building on East Camano Drive. There will be a brief orientation there; hike options will be discussed; maps will be given out; restrooms will be available. A Discover Pass is required if you park in either Cama State Park or Camano Island State Park.

WED. – FEB. 18 – LUMMI ISLAND

Walk a 7 mile loop on the north end of Lummi Island. Enjoy island, sea, and mountain views. A

\$7 foot-passenger ferry fare is required. The hike is mostly level. Walking shoes are recommended. Meet at **8:30 a.m.** at. the Chuckanut Drive park-nride, exit 231 from I-5 on the east side of I-5. There is no specified return time although most will take the 1 p.m. ferry back.

WED. – FEB. 25 – CONWAY-AREA DIKE WALK

The dike on the east side of the Skagit River north of Conway is now open to public use. Hike 3.3 miles one-way and then back. Meet at 9 a.m. in the parking area described below. You may leave when you return to your vehicle. You may lunch at the Conway Pub & Eatery. If the weather is clear there will be great views. Birds should be plentiful. From I-5 take exit 221 which is signposted Conway and Lake McMurray. This is also the Pioneer Hwy (SR 534) which leads to Stanwood. Turn west toward Conway/Stanwood and very shortly (100 yards) turn right on Fir Island Rd. into Conway. Go over the railroad tracks and in 100 yards turn right on Dike Rd. just before the bridge. Do not go over the South Fork of the Skagit River Bridge onto Fir Island! Parking is available on the left in 200 yards north of the unsigned dike district building.

Unexpected circumstances such as unforeseen trail problems, weather, predictions of heavy rain and/or wind, snow, ice, low wind chills, landslides, floods, logging, construction, or road conditions may cause cancellations or changes in the following hikes. Dogs are discouraged on Audubonsponsored hikes. If dogs are on a hike, they must be on a leash at all times. All the hikes are on a Wednesday. Call if you have questions anytime up until 7:45 the morning of the hike.

WED. - MARCH 4 - LILY LIZARD LAKES LOOP (LLLL)

This Loop will be done in a clock-wise order. On Blanchard Mountain hike the Lily Lake, Larry Reed, and Max's Shortcut Trails to Lily Lake and then on to Lizard Lake by way of a connector trail

from the North Butte Trail. Return to the trailhead via the Lizard and Lily Lake Trails. This hike is an 8.6 mile loop with a 1,600 ft. total elevation gain. There is an opportunity to go to the Oyster Dome

and the North Butte as well. We will divide into a faster and a slower group. Car pool accordingly. Meet at **8:30 a.m.** at. the Chuckanut Drive Park-n-Ride, exit 231 from I-5 on the east side of I-5. The faster group will return to the trailhead at 2:00 p.m. The slower group will return at 3:00 p.m. A **Discover Pass is required to park at the trailhead.**

WED. – MARCH 11 – SUGAR CUBE & WHISTLE LAKE

Terry Slotemaker or his designee will lead us on a hike in the Anacortes Forest Lands. The hike is 6.8 miles, with a 1,600 ft. elevation gain. Also available is a self-guided option hike of 3.41 miles around Whistle Lake. Meet at **9 a.m.** at the Heart Lake parking lot off the Heart Lake Road south of Anacortes. You may leave when you return to the trailhead.

WED. – MARCH 18 – GOOSE ROCK PERIMETER HIKE

Hike a loop that includes Cranberry Lake, beaches, the south side of Deception Pass, Cornet Bay and a 450 foot climb up Goose Rock. The total elevation gain for the day is 750 feet. Meet at **9 a.m.** in the east side parking lot at Cranberry Lake near the main entrance to Deception Pass State Park. The hike is 6.2 miles for the basic loop. Add 4.0 miles if you hike on the beach, south to the naval station border for a total of 10.2 miles. You may leave when your carload has returned to the trailhead.

A Discover Pass is required for parking.

WED. – MARCH 25 – AROUND MT. ERIE – The Mt. Erie Base Circumference Hike

The hike is through forests around the base of Mt. Erie. On its south side are occasional views of lakes, straits, bays, passages and islands. There are lots of ups and downs for a 1,300 ft. elevation gain. The loop hike is 6.3 miles or 6.6 with a side trip to the Whistle Lake view. Meet at **9:00 a.m.** in the parking lot at the Sugarloaf trailhead near the start of the Mt. Erie Road off the Heart Lake Road located south of Anacortes. The estimated return time is 1:00 p.m. You may leave when you return to the trailhead.

If a guide is available there may be an option to hike up Mount Erie from the south side. Portions of this steep trail include minor scrambling.

WED. – APRIL 1 – LOOKOUT MOUNTAIN PRESERVE

This trail is on the east side of Lookout Mountain above Lake Whatcom. It opened in 2013. The basic loop is 5.8 miles, which includes a side trail to a lookout. The elevation gain is 1,000 feet. Other options available include additional hiking above the Preserve and the Stimpson Family Nature Preserve. The trailhead is located a mile or so south of the Stimpson Family Nature Reserve on the Lake Louise Road. Whatcom County hikers should drive directly to the trailhead. Other hikers meet at the Chuckanut Drive Park-n-Ride in Burlington at 8:30 a.m. These people will drive to the trailhead by way of the Alger-Caine Lake Road, the South Lake Whatcom Boulevard, and the Lake Louise Road. We will meet at the trailhead about 9 a.m.

out at the morning field trip at Port Susan Bay. Skagit Audubon birders will volunteer to help the public see and enjoy the birds viewed from the graveled dike trail at the west end of Boe Road off Marine Drive, just 3 or 4 miles south of Stanwood, where the Nature Conservancy has its estuarine preserve. Bring your binos and scope if you have one, a field guide book to help show visitors the birds they see, and the usual generous spirit of sharing our knowledge and love of birds. Our field trip begins at 8:30 a.m. when we will go out on the dike and take an hour and a half to scope out the birds to be found. We'll return to the trailhead about 9:50 and station ourselves along the dike until about

noon. There are often good showings of shorebirds, raptors and waterfowl among other birds. If you can offer help to the public and-or bring a scope ~


